Our speaker this morning was Missy Bonderer with a report about the pool. She brought Linda Knierim and Jennifer Zagorac, who make up the rest of the pool committee. Missy talked about the fact that the pool was built in 1989 and they are working with eleven teenage lifeguards. Missy does the scheduling for the lifeguards, Linda is in charge of the Concessions, and Jennifer keeps track of the maintenance of the 30' X 80' pool that is open seven days a week from Memorial Day through Labor Day (hours 12-7 p.m.)

The Pool Committee starts in February with interviews with interested students at the high school and decisions are made by Spring Break. In April they work on cleaning, painting, and preparing the pool so that training can start in May. All lifeguards have to be certified through either the Red Cross or StarGuard, which they pay for themselves. June through August involves thousands of people coming to the pool, through \$4 day passes, family passes, four day cares, summer school students, and three different levels of public lessons starting with Water Babies. Then, September is time to wrap up everything. Missy said that they prefer not to think about the pool from October through January.

Missy praised Kyle Baker, who set up their on-line payment system for pool passes, lessons, and parties and Dave Taylor who keeps everything regarding the pool up-to-date on the Ashland Optimist website (<u>ashlandoptimist.org</u>).
